4-2. Establishment of Regional Network in Asia

4-2-1. Establishment of Institutional and Human Network

The ADRC places a high priority on the development of institutional and human network to share disaster information in the Asian region. Developing a human network with counterparts of member countries, advisor countries and observer organizations is vital to promote cooperation in disaster reduction in Asia. Therefore, the ADRC invites management level officials, including deputy director-generals, directors and managers to the ADRC International Meeting annually to encourage interpersonal exchanges.

4-2-3. Asian Disaster Reduction and Response Network (ADRRN)

Today, NGOs as well as governments and international organizations play active roles in disaster response and risk reduction in Asia. In addition to the rescue activities immediately after a disaster, they work in close cooperation with local communities to provide support in reconstruction and rehabilitation activities, and even disaster preparedness activities, such as disaster education and awareness raising activities in non-critical times. However, limited resources of individual NGOs to deal with disasters require them to further enhance their capabilities and strengthen their ties with relevant authorities.

The Asian Disaster Reduction Center (ADRC) co-organized the "Regional Workshop on Networking and Collaboration among Non-Governmental Organizations of Asian Countries in Disaster Risk Reduction and Responses" with the U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) Kobe, in February 2002 in Kobe, Japan. The workshop aimed to facilitate international networking and collaboration among disaster prevention/rescue NGOs in the Asian region, and gathered 35 participants from disaster-related NGOs in 16 Asian countries. Upon the consensus of the Workshop participants, it was decided to set up the Asian Disaster Reduction and Response Network (ADRRN) to promote cooperation among related NGOs. The ADRC as well as OCHA Kobe was granted the observer status for supporting the network's activities.

Especially after the Indian Ocean Tsunami occurred on 26 December 2004, the ADRRN has been increasing its presence in Asia and conducting

actively various disaster response, recovery and mitigation activities in tsunami-affected countries. From 29 to 31 October 2007, the ADRRN organized the Regional Workshop on Accountability in Humanitarian Practice in Kuala Lumpur, with the participation of 36 people from NGOs, UN agencies and others.

In addition to the annual meeting of the ADRRN, the workshop focused on acountability, inviting an expert from the Humanitarian Accountability Partnership International (HAP), which is a NGO based in Switzerland. The participants discussed applying humanitarian accountability principles in practice, as well as learnt the theory and principles of humanitarian accountability because of increasing demand for NGO's accountability.

Moreover, the ADRC, with support from the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), conducted the "NGO Training for Disaster Risk Reduction in Asia" from 3 to 14 December 2007 in Kobe, Japan. This program, which will be conducted from 2007 through 2009, aims to strengthen the disaster risk reduction capacity of the ADRRN and to further develop the network of local NGOs based in Asian countries.

Six members of NGOs from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, India, Malaysia, Philippines and Sri Lanka participated in this first year of the program and are expected to convey what they learn to their colleagues and other ADRRN members in the second year. This year's training program aimed (1) to impart accurate information about natural disasters and disaster risk reduction as well as to learn tools for educating and raising disaster awareness among school children and local people, (2) to equip participants to transfer the knowledge gained during the course to other ADRRN members as well as to their colleagues, and (3) to enable participants to prepare a draft action plan utilizing the knowledge they

gained during the course.

This training course consisted of lectures on specific and practical topics, such as the development of natural disaster knowledge, the introduction of tools for providing disaster education and raising public awareness, and disaster risk reduction activities being undertaken by Japanese NGOs. It also focused on stress management for NGO staff working in affected areas in the immediate aftermath of a disaster, on mental health care issues faced by victims of catastrophic disasters, as well as on the effectiveness of community radio during times of emergency. On the last day of the training course, the trainees gave presentations on their draft action plans and how they might be integrated into the on-going projects in which their organizations are involved. Each action plan reflected the knowledge and tools that were gained during the training course, and indicated ways that

they could be applied to the situations faced in the participants' own countries.

This training provided a great opportunity to develop the capacity of the trainees for disaster risk reduction, as well as to spend two weeks together learning more about one another's efforts.

In addition, through this programme, we reaffirmed the significance of roles of local NGOs in terms of disaster risk reduction which the Japanese central/local governments take major roles in. Since there are not many Asian countries that own clear assignments of roles in different governmental levels, NGOs need to play their roles as well in order to fill the gaps. Reflecting the present situation, the role of NGOs is crucial and indispensable.

In the second year of the program, the trainees will become trainers, sharing what they have learned among other ADRRN members. They are expected to develop a better training program next year utilizing the experiences of the first year training program.

ADRC believes that this programe will further contribute to promoting its network. ADRC is keen to further support the network for better disaster risk reduction in Asian coutires.
