6) Summary

As one of the public forums during the World Conference on Disaster Reduction (WCDR), the forum had a great significance for Asian countries to further promote Total Disaster Risk Management (TDRM) and identify concrete measures and actions effective in reducing risk and vulnerability to disasters in Asia. With Mr. Emmanuel de Guzman, Consultant to the ADRC, as the facilitator, government officials from Bangladesh, Philippines,

Laos, and China, as well as Tajikistan, made presentations on their good practices.

In addition, a special report on the situation of damage caused by the Indonesian Earthquake and Tsunami was provided by Mr. Sugeng Triutomo, Director, Dept. of Disaster Mitigation, National Disaster Management Coordinating Board, Indonesia.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed and excharged between the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) and the ADRC to establish long-standing cooperative ties in the area of natural disaster reduction. Mr. Koichiro Matsuura, Director-General of UNESCO, expressed his intention to promote the mutual exchange of information, experiences and theoretical and practical expertise regarding natural disaster reduction between the two organizations.

5-4-2. ADRRN Workshop

1) Theme:

Enhancing Effectiveness in Disaster Risk Management through Partnerships

2) Purpose:

Disaster risk management is a field that involves many players. Lack of collaboration poses a great challenge. A cross-sectoral partnership is effective for enhancing disaster risk management capability. Therefore, it is highly beneficial to establish a platform for a regional partnership to that effect. The Asian Disaster Reduction and Response Network (ADRRN) is one such platform that brings together NGOs and other key stakeholders including the ADRC and UN/OCHA Kobe.

Quoting good practices of ADRRN member NGOs, the workshop provided the audience including non-experts with an introductory insight into the role each individual and organization can play in disaster reduction, The workshop also placed a focus on the importance of, and challenges in, establishing a network and partnership involving all stakeholders.

7) Conclusion

The forum listened to various experiences in reducing negative impact of disasters from member NGOs of ADRRN that was formally structured in December 2003. It also focused on the importance of enhancing the multi-sectoral

partnership and network for effective disaster reduction.

It was agreed that complementing knowledge and resource sharing in the network would further enhance their delivery and managing disasters. A fresh small organization would benefit greatly from the network as they already have a wealth of experience and resources to be shared among the members.

All of these said, the network is not without challenges. The audience highlighted some of their concerns on how challenging it is to maintain a healthy and active network partnership in growing bigger. Regular meetings would be helpful in legitimizing transparency, accountability and operations. However the rapid growth and increasing numbers of organization and stakeholders in the region will put some stress on the network for funds and a strong administration. It was recognized that building up of concrete mechanism for securing fund is an important task for maintaining network.
